## ABOUT THIS SERVICE

### ABOUT TRINITY CHURCH'S ASSOCIATION WITH TRINITY SUNDAY

The first Trinity Church, built in 1698, was a modest rectangular structure with a gambrel roof and small porch. It was destroyed in the Great Fire of 1776 during the Revolutionary War. Construction on the second Trinity Church began in 1788; it was consecrated in 1790. In 1838, the support beams of the second Trinity Church buckled. Noted American architect Richard Upjohn was hired to repair the building. Instead he recommended demolishing the structure and constructing a new church. The Parish accepted his proposal. He designed a church in the style of a 14th century English parish church. Construction of the third Trinity Church began in 1839. It was consecrated on Ascension Day 1846, and is now undergoing "rejuvenation." It is considered one of the first and finest examples of Neo-Gothic architecture in the United States. With a 281-foot high steeple, Trinity was the tallest building in New York City until 1890.

### ABOUT TRINITY SUNDAY

Trinity Sunday is celebrated on the Sunday after Pentecost, coming at the end of the so-called "Year of Christ" that began in Advent and runs through Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week and Eastertide to the Day of Pentecost. Trinity Sunday also launches the beginning of the so-called "Year of the Church," the long season of Sundays after Pentecost when the liturgy focuses the people's attention on their call to ministry in Christ's name.

From its very beginnings, the faith of the Church has been centred on the mystery of the Trinity. The Baptismal Creed with its Trinitarian formula is evidence of this. New Christians are baptized in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, being immersed in the water or sprinkled with it three times.

The earliest known liturgies include many references to the persons of the Trinity, including prayers that end with Trinitarian doxologies. There was no specific feast of the Trinity in the early Church. Over time, dioceses and individual churches began to keep local feasts of the Trinity, perhaps in response to the challenge of Arianism, the 4th century heresy that holds that Jesus is not truly divine, but is a created being, subordinate to the Father. In contrast to this, at the Council of Nicaea (325) the Church affirmed that God is a Trinity of Persons, three-in-one, equal in nature and substance. In 1334 Pope John XXII established the date for the universal observance of Trinity Sunday in the Western Church as the First Sunday after Pentecost.

The Holy Trinity is a mystery. By mystery the Church does not mean a riddle or an enigma, but rather a reality above our human comprehension, a truth that we may begin to grasp, but ultimately can only come to glimpse through worship, symbol, and faith. It has been said that mystery is not a wall to run up against, but an ocean in which to swim.

To affirm the Trinity is to believe that God is relational, an intimacy of love within Godself and which extends beyond Godself to reach out and embrace all things as Creator, Living Word and Life-giving Spirit.

*It is our custom to receive the bread in the upturned palms of our hands, eat the bread immediately, and then take a sip from the chalice. Please grasp the bottom of the chalice to guide it to your lips. You may choose to dip the bread in the wine and then eat it, or you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice-bearer to dip it in the wine and place on your tongue. You may receive both the bread and the wine, or only the bread or only the wine, as you choose.*

*Gluten-free wafers are available; please let the minister know that you need one.*

*The ushers will bring you forward by row to receive communion. We receive at one station at the front of the center aisle and return to our seats by the side aisles.*

*If you do not wish to receive communion you are invited to come forward to receive a blessing, indicating your desire by crossing your arms over your chest.*

*If you would like to pray confidentially with someone, for yourself or for others, please go through the doors closest to the pulpit and a prayer minister will meet you in the foyer.*



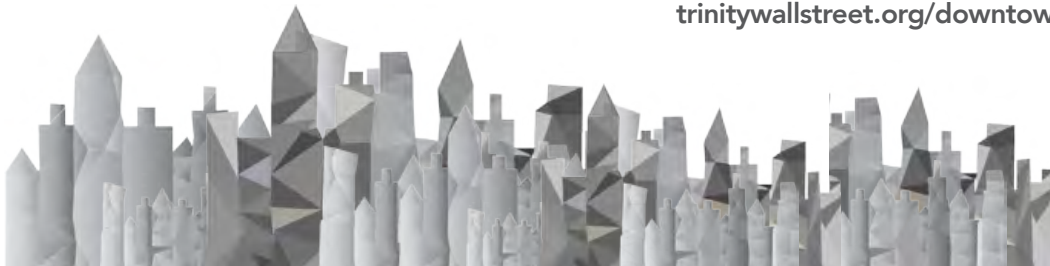

The image on the bulletin cover is the Trinity Seal. Inspired by The Revelation to John 10:1–10, it represents the arrival of the first Anglican Church in the colony of New York in 1697. The seal features a “mighty angel” with a “face like the sun, and his legs like pillars of fire,” straddling the sea and the land and transferring the Gospel, brought from England by the ship, to a child, a symbol of the young colony of New York. In the scroll below the angel’s feet appear the words “JURO TEMPUS NON FORE AMPLIUS” which translate as “I Swear That There Shall Be No More Delay,” referring to the urgency of establishing the Church.

This service is based on The Holy Eucharist: Rite Two, which begins on page 355 of the *Book of Common Prayer* (BCP). Scripture readings are appointed by the *Revised Common Lectionary* (Episcopal) and are excerpted from the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible. Psalm texts are taken from the *St. Helena Psalter*. The bulletin cover collect is from *Revised Common Lectionary Prayers* (RCLP), proposed by the Consultation on Common Texts. Texts marked as adapted have been substantially altered from the cited source material by the Rev. Bruce Jenneker: they may not be edited by the Liturgical Desktop Publisher without his explicit written direction. Other liturgical elements may include materials compiled at Trinity Church from *Enriching Our Worship 1* (EOW 1), *Contemporary Parish Prayers* (CPP), *The Book of Occasional Services* (BOS), and the prayer books of other member churches of the Anglican Communion.

Hymns come from *The Hymnal 1982*, *Lift Every Voice and Sing II* (LEVAS II), *Wonder, Love, and Praise* (WLP), *Voices Found* (VF), and other contemporary hymnals.
