## ABOUT THIS SERVICE

### THE GREAT FIFTY DAYS OF EASTER

After forty days of fasting and self-discipline, like marathon runners, exhausted, breathless and weary now, we make one final effort to reach the finish line. "It is Easter, we say. Alleluia, it's over." And yet, it is not over at all, it is just beginning. Now is the time of festival—a festival that lasts for 50 days, until the Day of Pentecost.

There are two seasons—one before Easter and the other after. The season before Easter signifies the troubles in which we live here and now, while the time after Easter which we are celebrating at present signifies the happiness that will be ours in the future. Alleluia. Alleluia. Alleluia!

### EASTERTIDE—THE SEASON OF SUNDAYS OF EASTER

Easter is a season, not a day—rather, a Great Fifty days, a Week of Weeks, 7 the perfect number seven multiplied by its own perfection plus one day more to make perfection perfect. The First Week of Easter has Collects, Psalms, and Readings provided in the *Book of Common Prayer* Lectionary. The Weekdays of Easter begin after the Second Sunday of Easter.

Since the triumphs of the saints and Major Feasts are a continuation and manifestation of the Paschal victory of Christ, the following are observed during Eastertide:

**Saint Mark the Evangelist:** April 29

**Saint Philip and St. James, Apostles:** May 1

**Eastertide Rogation Days:** Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, May 27-29

**Ascension Day:** May 30

**Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary:** May 31

### THE ACTS OF THE APOSTLES

Following the ancient tradition of the Church, the First Lessons provide of a semi-continuous reading of the Acts of the Apostles. We begin reading this account on the Weekdays of Easter Week.

The Readings from the Gospel of John are chosen for their appropriateness to the season and complement the readings from John assigned to the Weekdays of Lent.

### THE PASCHAL CANDLE

The large candle from the Great Vigil of Easter burns in a prominent place in the Church at every service during Eastertide. In the ancient Christian basilicas, some of which still exist in Italy, the stand for the Paschal Candle was built into the pulpit as a permanent feature of the building's architecture. In the Middle Ages, Winchester Cathedral had a Paschal Candle that was sixty feet tall!

## ALLELUIA

This word, derived from the Hebrew *hallelujah*, means “praise to Yahweh.” In Jewish worship, it is particularly characteristic of Passover. As early as the time of the writing of the book of Revelation (probably by the 2nd century), “Hallelujah” was already established as an important word in the Church’s liturgical vocabulary.

## BAPTISMAL FONT

The Baptismal Font remains in the Sanctuary for the duration of Eastertide—the principal Baptismal Season of the Church Year. After you have received Communion, you are invited to dip your finger into the water in the Font and make the sign of the cross in recognition of the blessings you have received in your Baptism.



Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

*All* Christ has died.  
Christ is risen.  
Christ will come again.

*Celebrant* Remembering the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we now present to you from your creation this bread and this wine. By your Holy Spirit may they be for us the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ. Grant that we who share these gifts may be filled with the Holy Spirit and live as Christ's Body in the world. Bring us into the everlasting heritage of your daughters and sons, that with [\_\_\_\_\_ and] all your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever.

Please grasp the bottom of the chalice to guide it to your lips. You may choose to dip the bread in the wine and then eat it, or you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice-bearer to dip it in the wine and place on your tongue. You may receive both the bread and the wine, or only the bread or only the wine, as you choose.*

*Gluten-free wafers are available; please let the minister know that you need one.*

*The ushers will bring you forward by row to receive communion.*

*If you do not wish to receive communion you are invited to come forward to receive a blessing, indicating your desire by crossing your arms over your chest.*

*The organist plays an improvisation while communion is received.*

The bulletin cover collect is from *Revised Common Lectionary Prayers* (RCLP), proposed by the Consultation on Common Texts. The Prayers of the People were composed by the Rev. Bruce Jenneker; they may not be edited by the Liturgical Desktop Publisher without his explicit written direction. Other liturgical elements may include materials compiled at Trinity Church from *Enriching Our Worship* (EOW), *Common Worship: Times and Seasons* (CW:TS), *Contemporary Parish Prayers* (CPP) and *New Parish Prayers* (NPP) edited and compiled by Frank Colquhoun, and the prayer books of other member churches of the Anglican Communion.

Hymns come from *The Hymnal 1982*, *Lift Every Voice and Sing II* (LEVAS II), *Wonder, Love, and Praise* (WLP), *Voices Found* (VF), and other contemporary hymnals.
