WELCOME

The Officiant stands and faces the People, welcoming them using these or similar words:

Officiant Welcome to the historic Chapel of All Saints for Evensong.
As you might know, Evensong is Evening Prayer which is chanted with music. We all pray Evensong together, so please follow along in your bulletin and join in as indicated and when you feel comfortable doing so.

At two points in the service tonight, we will ask for a volunteer to come forward to read the appointed reading of scripture. Anyone can volunteer to read, even if you have never done this before! So just raise your hand at that point if you feel called to do so.

There is a notebook in the lectern that you will read from, so there is no need to bring your bulletin with you.

Now let's pause and take a few breaths before we start with tonight's service of Evensong.

Silence is kept.

The Officiant looks at the notebook in the lectern to make sure that it's ready and turned to tab 1.

Here ends the Reading.

The Officiant stands and faces the People.

Officiant Please stand as you are able for the Song of Mary.


The People stand.

If not, put your notebook in your seat and walk to the lectern and set the tab for the second reading.*



The Officiant stands and faces the People.


