# THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

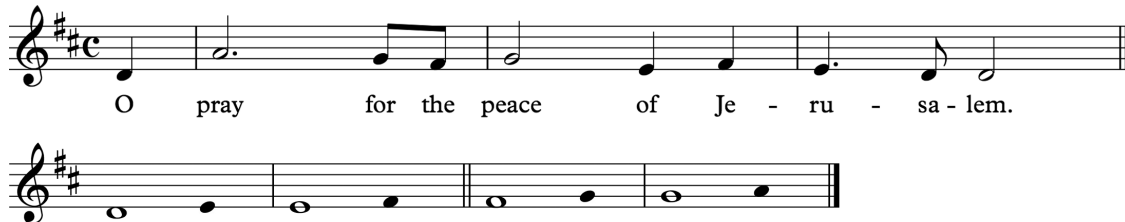

## THE SECOND READING

Acts 8:26-40

Reader

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went.

Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him.

Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth." The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus.

As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

Simon answered, "I suppose the one for whom he canceled the greater debt." And Jesus said to him, "You have judged rightly."

Then turning toward the woman, he said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I entered your house; you gave me no water for my feet, but she has bathed my feet with her tears and dried them with her hair. You gave me no kiss, but from the time I came in she has not stopped kissing my feet. You did not anoint my head with oil, but she has anointed

my feet with ointment. Therefore, I tell you, her sins, which were many, have been forgiven; hence she has shown great love. But the one to whom little is forgiven, loves little." Then he said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." But those who were at the table with him began to say among themselves, "Who is this who even forgives sins?" And he said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you; go in peace."



*People* **The disciple was the one  
who was converted that day  
through the generous imagination  
of the excluded Ethiopian Eunuch.**



<i>Preacher</i>	When people in power feel displaced they often turn towards fear
<i>People</i>	<b>and in their sense of exile they sometimes rejoice in destruction.</b>
<i>Preacher</i>	We know that change is one of the ways of God in making home among us.
<i>People</i>	<b>May change be welcomed. Especially the kind of change that displaces privilege.</b>
<i>Preacher</i>	God, you set up your home among us, in the human heart.
<i>People</i>	<b>Change us, convert our hearts.</b>
<i>Preacher</i>	Our hearts are often addicted to fear.
<i>People</i>	<b>Change us into people and societies of justice and shelter.</b>
<i>Preacher</i>	We know that some only see their fear when they see someone they do not want to know.
<i>People</i>	<b>"Do you see this person?" God asks us.</b>
<i>Preacher</i>	And often, the awful answer has been "No."
	We turn in prayer towards forty-nine names of people who were not seen for who they were: beloved, dignified, embodied.
<i>People</i>	<b>We see them. We honour them. May their names be blessings forever.</b>
<i>Preacher</i>	We pray for everyone who loved them
<i>People</i>	<b>That they may be supported in Justice and sheltered in kindness.</b>

*Preacher* We have heard their names with a bell.  
We now take a moment in silence  
to honour their names  
and the names of all those we know  
whose lives have been taken.

*Silence*

*People* **We honour these names  
heard aloud and heard in the heart.  
And in their name  
we cry out for safety and dignity.**

*Preacher* God you know all our names.  
You know the hope of every story  
And you know the shock when  
a story is so abruptly interrupted.  
We pray for all family members of everyone involved;  
all of those bereaved;  
all of those affected;  
all of those injured;  
all of those afraid  
and all those who respond to such traumas.

*People* **We cry out to you, oh God,  
May our voices rise to you  
as we call for justice, change  
and safety for all your beloved people  
especially those  
whose lives  
are most regularly  
demeaned.**

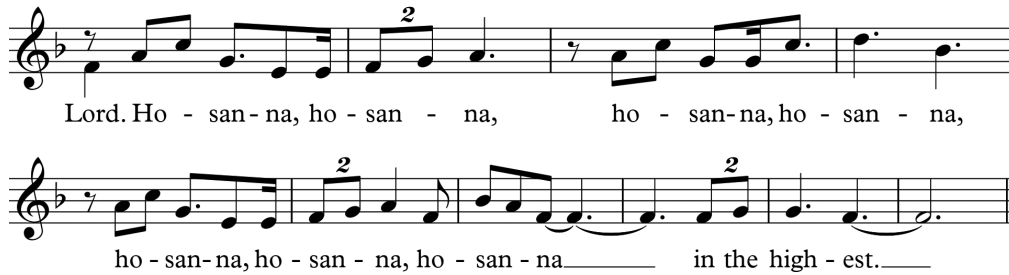

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

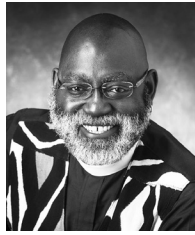

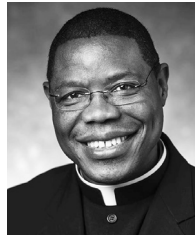
